Mission: FPF's reason for existence

FPF's mission is to help neighbors connect and build community, thereby increasing local resiliency. We do that by hosting a network of online local forums covering all of Vermont and a few dozen towns in surrounding states, where neighbors share postings and engage about a wide variety of topics. We further our mission by providing other features, such as our paid ads, directory and community calendar. The resulting increase in social capital and community cohesion benefits neighbors, government, local businesses, nonprofits and local media.

Vision: How communities we serve, and FPF itself, will appear in the future

FPF's vision is of thriving and resilient communities that consistently demonstrate a commitment to a shared future. These communities are filled with informed residents who know, support, and trust their neighbors without regard to their political affiliation, organize with neighbors in support of community goals, participate in local democratic processes, value and rely on local journalism, support area nonprofits, and spend their money with local businesses. Our vision for FPF itself is as critical civic infrastructure for every community in our coverage area, with an ownership, governance and financial model that supports this work for many generations to come.

FPF 2021 accomplishments

Front Porch Forum continued to serve its social mission and the communities of Vermont through all of 2021. We did this work despite and because of the multiple crises that roiled the nation and Vermont during 2020 and 2021, including the Covid-19 pandemic, the struggle for racial justice, economic hardship, disinformation campaigns and political divisiveness, upheaval and violence.

In response to these crises, FPF took many steps, including:

- Continued to evolve our posting moderation model to fact check postings about challenging topics
- Upgraded FPF policies to better address major issues that emerged in 2020 and 2021
- Added staff to better handle increasing load
- Discounted our advertising prices for small businesses (ongoing)
- Offered free access options to public officials and nonprofits to address pandemic issues
- Participated in VPR's One Small Step program to bring Vermonters from the left and right side of the political spectrum into civil conversation

During 2021, FPF's service grew on many fronts, as demonstrated by these statistics:

- 210,000 members (for every 1,000 households in VT, FPF has 750 members)
- 15% growth in total number of postings submitted by members over past two years
- 72 million Email Forums sent to members (22% growth over past two years)
- 8% growth in clicks on local business advertisements over past two years
- 31% growth in website pageviews over past two years
- 24% increase in 1-day active users of mobile app over past two years
- 24-person engaged and stable staff
